HOMELESS? IN SIMI VALLEY?

The County of Ventura 2009 Homeless count has now been completed. The total count of homeless for all of Ventura County is 1,715 persons. Of these, 303 were counted in Simi Valley. Of these 303 persons:

- 98 % were living on the street, 2% in facilities
- 5% were seniors (62+), 18% were between the ages of 18-24, 1% were unaccompanied youth (without parents) between the ages of 13-17
- 69% were men, 31% were women
- 69% of adults were white; 23% were Hispanic or Latino; 1% were American Indian or Alaskan Native; 3% were African-American or black; 1% were Asian/Pacific Islander; and 3% were other
- 67% were born in California
- 12% of the total number of persons counted were children
- 18 families were counted 10 two-parent families with children and 8 one-parent families with children.

In a fundraising trek to combat world hunger, three 60-year-old Lutheran pastors from West Virginia are pedaling cross-country on a bamboo bicycle built for three.

Pastors David Twedt, Ron Schlak and Fred Soltow Jr., self-described best friends, are attempting to visit 65 cities and cover 13,000 miles in 100 days in what they dub the Tour de Revs.

On sabbaticals from their regular pastoral duties, they started their journey May 13 in Chicago at the national headquarters of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. They plan to complete the trip Aug. 19 during the ELCA's Churchwide Assembly in Minneapolis, Minn.

On a Web site devoted to the trio's trek, http://www.tourderevs. Org, the pastors explain that the goal of their tour is to encourage contributions to support the church's anti-hunger, anti-poverty ministry known as ELCA World Hunger.

"We are seeking funds form individuals, congregations, and synods to support the ELCA in meeting the \$25 million annual goal set in 1999," they say. "Along the, the team will also encourage folks to set personal health and wellness goals."

The three, who blog daily as they pedal on their "triplet" bicycle from city to city, say they also want to stimulate "hunger committees and local congregations to formulate and implement realistic plans to eradicate hunger within this lifetime! We also want to get our religious partners active to make 'wellness' a higher priority within this church."

But why a bamboo bicycle? "Bamboo has numerous qualities that make it an excellent material for a bicycle frame," their Web site states.

"It has excellent tensional rigidity with the dampening quality of carbon fiber and the durability of steel. Bamboo is a readily available, self-generating, renewable resource that leaves no carbon footprint. It's a great bike to ride!"

Christopher Carpenter, associate director for ELCA World Hunger, said the church is not officially sponsoring the pastors' cross-country trip, but is supportive of it.

"It's about three people who are very passionate about ending hunger in the world." Carpenter said. "When they were confronted with the realities of hunger and poverty both internationally and domestically, they really felt compelled to do something to tell their story and the story of those who are hungry in the world."

The 65-city bike tour, Carpenter said, "is their faithful response how to live out their calling as pastors but also as conscientious people in the world who care about those who remain in poverty."
